Topic: Printing

| Key Vocabulary | |
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| printing | Printing is the process of producing more than one copy of text or images. A colour e.g. paint is applied to a surface and then pressed down to transfer the image. This process can be repeated to produce the same text or image multiple times. |
| pattern | A repeated decorative design. |
| contrast | To be strikingly different. In artwork, it can mean using opposite colours from the colour wheel. |
| repeated | To be done or to occur several times in the same way. |
| transfer | To move something from one place to another. |
| pound | To strike or hit something heavily and repeatedly. |
| dye | A natural or created substance used to add a colour to or change the colour of something. |
| score | A notch or line that is cut or scratched into a surface. |
| mimic | To imitate or copy something. |
| enhance | To increase or improve the quality of something. |



Knowledge:

Develop knowledge of print to produce pieces of artwork using objects to create prints, taking inspiration from the environment.

To master printing skills:

Key Facts



What is Rangoli?

Rangoli is a decorative folk art originating from India. It is created on the ground in front of entrances to homes, inside

the homes and in courtyards during celebrations to bring good luck and to welcome Hindu gods and goddesses. The art is both a religious and cultural symbol. The details in Rangoli decorations can include lotus flowers, mango leaves, geometric shapes, or other elaborate designs made of rice flour, coloured sand, or even flower petals.

How to Create a Hammered Leaf or Flower Print

- Lay the leaf/flower on a piece of paper and cover with a piece of kitchen roll.
- 2. On the kitchen roll, draw arrows to show the area that you need to hammer and the directions that you will go in.
- 3. Pound the leaf all over following the directional arrows. The natural dyes will be released and will transfer onto the paper.
- 1. Part way through, peel back the kitchen roll to check your progress. Areas that still need to be hammered will not be shown on the kitchen paper. The visible parts on the kitchen roll are the areas that have already been pounded.
- 5. Carefully remove the kitchen roll and peel the leaf/flower off the paper to reveal the print.
